Message from the Officer in Charge

With the easing of Provincial health restrictions, and corresponding resumption of our communities daily activities, the first and second quarters of 2021 have been particularly busy periods for the Mission RCMP.

This is my first policing report for calendar year 2021 and encompasses the first 2 quarters from January 1st to June 30th of this year. As part of my commitment to the continued modernization of the Mission RCMP, I have made changes to this reporting format. The previous version of



our policing report has been in use for 6 years (Insp. De Jager) and was no longer in line with how other policing services are reporting to their communities. This report will be more focussed on metrics related to Community Safety with some highlights of activities taking place.

For 2021, the District of Mission once again hosted an online Policing Priorities survey (portions of which follow). I understand that this years' survey had approximately 281 contributors as compared to the 600 plus respondents who participated in 2020. After review of the 2021 survey results the policing priorities for 2021 have been set as:


2021 RCMP Priorities

- Property Crime Reducing the Impact of Property Crime in our Community
- Traffic Safety Promoting Public Safety through Traffic Education, Visibility & Enforcement
- Violent Crime Reduce the Impact of Violent Crime in our Community
- Indigenous Communities Strengthening relations with Indigenous Communities
- Employee Wellness Contributing to Employee Wellness

As in previous reports, this report will be presented in two parts, with the majority presented in an open council meeting. The second part of the report deals with specific police operations and investigations which can only be presented in closed council due to the sensitive nature of the material, such as finances detailed to specific projects, deployment of resources and details of public complaints against the RCMP.

Survey Results

Question options

- Traffic enforcement (i.e. aggressive driving, distracted driving)
- Youth engagement and development (i.e. school resource officer, outreach)
- Community engagement (i.e. community crime watch, patrols)
- Family violence (i.e. domestic abuse, threats)
- Impaired driving (i.e. drugs/alcohol)
- Illegal drug-related offences (i.e. possession, trafficking)
- Crimes against persons (i.e. assaults and threats)
- Property crimes (i.e. vandalism, theft from motor vehicles, break and enters, etc.)
- Fraud (i.e. telephone or cyber fraud, identity theft)

Other Highlights

- The majority of person completing the survey (60%) had not been a victim of crime in the previous year
- 40% of people felt that crime had gone up while 60% did not know or disagreed
- The majority of respondents (227) feared crime the most at their home
- Traditional police activities such as Visibility, Enforcement and Investigation where deemed to be
 the most effective strategies in tackling crime as compared to gathering intelligence or engaging in
 education and prevention.
- The majority of respondents believed that police and public safety would benefit from increased partnerships with other agencies and increased engagement with the public through volunteerism and expansion of community based Crime Prevention Programs such as Block watch
- The majority of suggestions to assist police centred around increasing our abilities in Mental Health response, increasing visibility and increased speeding enforcement


Looking Ahead


- Mission RCMP recently deployed the use of our fully equipped police motorcycle which is paying very large dividends in visibility and traffic enforcement

- We will be launching the Mission RCMP Facebook page in the near future.











Property Crime June














Administrative and Victim Services Statistics YTD May 31








Crime Prevention Office YTD May 31
















Traffic Enforcement Statistics YTD June 30
